

## NOOKSACK NORDICS JOURNEY TO LAKE WENATCHEE

Trip leader, Lynn Alderson, rented the Farmhouse in Plain, WA. The Farmhouse is a four-bedroom house about seven miles from Lake Wenatchee, with privacy and a well-stocked kitchen. This is the second year Lynn has led this trip and the logistics went smoothly, with no problems. The five members who went this year was; Lynn Alderson, Debra Jusak, Lynn Oliver, Elizabeth Martindale and myself, Kurt Duey.

A three-hour journey, through Everett, and over Stevens Pass found me at the Sno-Park in Lake Wenatchee State Park. Lake Wenatchee South had a lot of needles and small sticks in the trails, so I went to Lake Wenatchee North, where the trails were clearer of debris. The snow was freezing at night and melting during the day, less than ideal conditions but skiable. The trail along the north

lakeshore was sunny and pleasant and the trail back in the trees was colder with better snow. This trail has a horrible hill and would be a great trail if not for it. I went down the hill on track skis the first time and got my backcountry skis to see if there was a better way down, (there wasn't). There was about a foot of snow on the trail and it was being groomed about three times a week.

I rendezvoused with the other members at the Farmhouse for a hot shower and delicious home cooked meal. Some members had gone to the Steven's Pass Nordic Center to ski Friday and reported similar snow conditions.

Saturday I headed toward a trail that was supposed to take me to Nason Ridge. It was off of highway two and started as a forest Service Rd., used by snowmobiles. It was fairly rough and icv in the morning and as I climbed up it I explored branch roads that I hoped would join to the Nason Ridge system. I had been climbing for several hours met three local when snowmobilers, who told me that this road went up the mountain to a communication tower about another mile up the road. The trailhead to Nason Ridge was earlier, under the power lines. I had my lunch and went up a little farther to where I could see off to the north-east. There was Nason Ridge down below me. I obviously missed the trailhead and taken another one. I made the best of it and practiced my step-turns going back down the mountain. step-turn is a good alternative to snow-plow and is an the excellent chance to practice stepping onto your other ski and pointing off in another direction.

I never miss an opportunity to practice improving my turns, (they need it). Debra and Lynne O. had tried to ski Nason Ridge also, with better success. The official map is inaccurate and they were led on a merry trip, looking for intersections that didn't exist.

The next day Debra and I went to the unmarked trailhead under the power lines to Nason Ridge and made another attempt to ski this elusive trail. After 1.6 kilometers of ungroomed snow with detours around washouts on the road, we came to the groomed trails. With our collective experience we were able to find the correct trail, (no thanks to the map or signage on the trail). 5.9 gentle kilometers got us up to the Ridge. The scenery was great but the weather had been getting cloudy and windy all day. On the Ridge it was particularly bad. continued along the Ridge, until time and energy dictated that we turn back the way we had come and not complete the loop. I promised Debra that we would come back next year and try again.

# NICKEL PLATE SKI TRIP MARCH 7 – 9, 2013

Cost: \$168 USD.

There are 50 km of groomed Track set Trails and 20 km of backcountry trails behind Apex Mountain. To see their web site, go to Nickelplate Nordic. This is, in my opinion, one of the better Nordic trail systems in B.C with a very active club that keeps the facilities in top condition. This site has the longest ski season

with its high elevation. I also recommend that members may elect to Ski China Ridge above Princeton, with 40 kilometers of trails, on the way to Nickelplate, this is another possibility for members who prefer the quiet beauty of the B.C. mountains. It is tracked but not groomed as well as Nickelplate. It has several warming huts and a backcountry cabin as well. To see their web site click on Chinaridge Trails. It is 176 miles to the Apex Mountain Resort, where our lodging will be located. Carpooling is encouraged.
