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NICKEL PLATE TRIP A HUGE SUCCESS

The ski conditions at Nickel Plate Nordic Center were some of the best I have ever experienced there. While below freezing the whole time, the temperatures did not go below 12 degrees C.; Cold but not extremely so. Two of our three days there we had fresh snow. Our trip corresponded with the largest snowfall they had had there so far this season, six inches in two days. This year they opened on the 15th of November and will probably be open to ski through April. There is actually snow there until June but most people are doing other things by then. With the top rate grooming they do at Nickel Plate, the trails were fast and fun, with no icing. The 6,000 foot elevation and open terrain can make for high winds but we were in luck and they didn't blow until Monday, the day we left.

Four of us drove there in my Audi Allroad, which was a good thing, as it was snowing when we left Bellingham and the other drivers were freaking out to have two inches of snow on the road. The county roads to Sumas had up to six inches in places but the M+S tires handled the road without incident.

Likewise we weren't held up more than five minutes at the border. From there it is a short drive north to Highway 1, which is a vital road for the Canadians and always in better conditions than the roads in Whatcom County.

We stopped at The Blue Moose to eat and take a break. As always their menu was tasty and quick. We tried walking around the town square but the snow was quite deep and hadn't been cleared off all the sidewalks. It was probably the most snow I've ever seen in this rainy outpost of Northwest Culture.

From there we took Highway 3 through Manning Park all the way to Princeton, where we stopped at the new, modern grocery store. It's definitely better than anything in Hope and a good place to buy food as we were cooking for ourselves this trip.

From Princeton we continued on down the valley through the mining town of Hedley, turning off on the Nickel Plate Mine Road. It was a single lane graveled track zig-zagging up the side of the mountain. It had maybe three inches of snow on it and only one other set of tire prints on it. The car slowly took us up past the clouds into the high country where the Nordic tracks are located.

It was two o'clock when we arrived and the ticket seller had left for the day, but the trails were there and we were determined to ski. We met Lynn, our trip leader, at the Center and skied for a few hours before going on to our chalet. The snow was new and not icy. We went around Buck's Trek and really enjoyed ourselves in the fluffy snow, laid a few inches upon the groomed trail. When it is good here there is no better place to ski and this was one of those days.

I could go on in such detail about the other three days but suffice to say the snow and weather conditions continued to be very good. We shared each other's company and food and were well nourished by both. Oh, and we had a good look at a female moose that crossed the road in front of us, as we were returning to Bellingham. I'm so glad that I could make it on this trip and want to thank Lynn Alderson for her selfless efforts to make it happen.
