DON'T FORGET! BUY A SNO-PARK PERMIT

Just a reminder that Sno-Park permits are required to park at the Salmon Ridge Sno-Park or across the road at the Silver Fir campground and Anderson Creek road trail head. Where do the fees go? They go into a dedicated pot to support winter recreation. They pay for snow removal, sanitation facilities, trail grooming, trail signs, mapping, education and enforcement and administration of the Winter Recreation program. The \$40 annual permit allows you access to over 40 Sno-Parks throughout the state. This year, WDFW officers will join the USFS and the County Sheriff to do more Sno-Park permit education and enforcement. So be sure you have your Sno-Park permits! The fines are steep and do nothing to help fund winter recreation.

You can buy a permit through the NNSC, or on-line at: WA State Parks & Recreation, (click on winter recreation and then purchase a Sno-Park permit online). Or you can buy them at: Backcountry Essentials, Crossroads Grocery and Video in Maple Falls, REI, Discover Your Northwest, (at the Glacier Ranger Station).

ANDERSON CREEK RD



Thanksgiving 2017 saw another large rain event in the forest that caused damage to numerous Mt. Baker Ranger District roads.

Above is a photo of our twicerepaired Anderson Creek Road as of November 2017.

This coming winter, the groomer may or may not be able to pack

snow on this road and groom it. Snow conditions will determine whether this is a viable ski trail.

Since a RAC grant repair, followed by significant work by Citizens for Forest Roads was unsuccessful, the solution is a \$70k bridge.

At this time, we have no idea where funding may come from, Possibilities include if ever. partnership with Citizens for Forest Roads, a remote chance that this could be included in ERFO (Emergency Relief for Owned Roads Federallv Program) projects by USFS, or USFS restart of logging operations with may help funding.

NNSC Finances

It has been almost 2 years since we published an overview of the club budget in *Snow News*. The club is in a stable position financially, and the 2017-18 budget looks much like the previous one, and the one before that. Major changes from previous years include loss of NRTP funding to brush trails and groom, but increased WA Sno-Park funding.

The numbers look quite large (see next page for Budget). Several line items are essentially "flow through" funds where income eventually equals expenses. SnoPark permit revenues match SnoPark permit expenses. Club trip funds go through our checking account, but expenses should equal receipts.

The club pays for Salmon Ridge trail maintenance and grooming

of White Salmon and Hannegan seeks NRTP Rds. then We quickly reimbursement. adjust NRTP-funded activities on the size of biennial (every 2 years) NRTP grants. If NRTP funds are not awarded, as just happened, then we curtail snow grooming outside the SnoPark and reduce or delay paid The club simply maintenance. afford those kinds cannot expenses out of the treasury. We juggle allocation of that NRTP funding between 2 years of budget as well.

After all of these large expenses are done, the bottom line is that the club, outside of Salmon Ridge, runs on about \$2500 in dues. Dues pay for meeting room rentals, publicity, web site maintenance. newsletter preparation and mailing, and administrative expenses. Administrative expenses are things like 501(c)3 filing, state non-profit fees, any legal expenses. post office box, postage, and anything else that The table below comes up. color codes the club expenses and the various flow through budget items.

BOARD MEETING SUMMARY

This is a summary of the October and November 2017 board meetings.

The budget is stable and looks like previous years. The board agreed to cover mowing that went over budget using the remaining REI grant funds.

Pete is heading up Ambassador Days, starting 12/30/17, for 5 Saturdays 10 AM– 2 PM, at Salmon Ridge Sno-Park.

Both ends of the new connector trail between White Salmon and Cougar Loop are in good enough condition that people can follow it. Those sections are described as from White Salmon to the look out, and from Cougar to the big tree. Each is about 1/4 the total distance. Barb from USFS has walked the trail with Pete and is on board with NNSC's plans.

Pacific Northwest Trail would like to take part of PNT off Mt. Baker Highway, roughly following NNSC's connector trail. Various board members have had some discussion with them. Any partnership with PNT is a very long term project.

WA State Parks has given approval to groom all trails, including White Salmon and Hannegan, with SnoPark funds. Grooming will be Mon and Fri.

Pete is in charge of short, day trips and planning a new sign up and email system based on nnsc.org instead of the previous Google group.

Rachel Ropkey was appointed to the board to fill a vacancy.

Board elections take place at the February general meeting.

Speakers have been secured for all six 2017-18 meetings.

The board is reviewing and modifying job descriptions for NNSC positions so that we can accurately describe to volunteers what they are being asked to do. Most of those are approved and complete.

LAKE WENATCHEE

February 2 thru 5, 2018

This trip is being offered 2 weeks earlier than in the past.

This area offers six different skiing locations within 16 miles of where we are staying. The Wenatchee River bisects Lake Wenatchee State Park, thus creating the South Park and North park. The South Park has 18.6 miles and the North Park has 3.1 miles of groomed trails. Skate skiing is available in the North Park. South Park also offers tubing and a snow play area. There are 4.9 miles of snow shoeing trails. Nearby is Chiwawa with the See and Ski trail groomed for track and skate skiing for 4 miles. Flying loop and Squirrel Run are 2.9 and 2.5 miles, respectively. Nason Ridge is now open to XC skiing thanks to Weyerhaeuser. Lower and Upper Nason Ridge offers approximately 4 miles and 8 miles of groomed trails, respectively. There is also backcountry trails in the area.

A Sno Park Permit and a Special Groomed Trails Permit sticker are required. Drivers are responsible for the Sno Park Permit. Riders will share the cost of the Special Permit. The Special Permit will stay with the driver after the trip is completed.

February 16 thru 19, 2018

4 days of skiing, staying 3 nights at a cost of \$250 USD per person including meals, double occupancy.

This high altitude ski destination offers three different settings to ski in. It is less than five hours from Bellingham on good, wellmaintained roads. We will be staying at the fabulous Highland House B&B in Logan Lake, BC. offering 5 luxury bedrooms with 2 beds and private full bathrooms. This place is really nice! The cost includes meals (hearty breakfasts with many choices, sack trail lunches, substantial dinners. special dietary needs accommodated). The outdoor hot tub and setting are as outstanding as the rest of the B&B. To visit their website go to: www.highlandhouse.ca.

Enjoy great skiing at any or all of XC-ski areas: three ultragroomed Stake Lake, semigroomed Logan Lake, and seldom groomed Kane Valley. 5 min. from our B&B, Logan Lake at 1180 meters (base) has 36 kilometers of skate and classic track. Trail fee is \$7. They have 2 km of night-lit groomed trails. On the web go to www.loganlake.com . 20 min. from our B&B, Stake Lake at 1315 meters (base) has 60 kilometers of skate and classic track. Trail fee is \$15. lt features a large warming hut. On the web go to overlanderskiclub.com. 1 hr. from our B&B. Kane Valley at 1160 meters (base) has 50 kilometers of classic and ungroomed trails. Trail fee is \$7. It can be skied on the way up and/or on the way back.

NICKEL PLATE

March 2 thru 5, 2018

Nickel Plate Nordic Centre is located in the Okanagan Valley, just 45 minutes from Penticton. It has approximately 34 miles of groomed trails for both classic and skate skiing. Additionally, there is 9 miles of marked snowshoe trails. Nickel Plate has one of the longest ski seasons in the western hemisphere, with trails for all abilities. Elevation is 6,000 feet.

Nickel Plate has a warm and cozy 4,000 square foot day lodge with kitchen, eating and lounge areas, and separate heated washrooms and shower facilities. Source: nickelplatenordic.org. We will be staying in a Rustic Ski Condo near Apex Ski Resort. It will be a 15 minute drive to the Nickel Plate Nordic Center from the condo. The condo is called Rustic Ski Condo at Keremeos, BC. It can be seen at www.airbnb.com. The exposed log beams and stamped concrete flooring give this condo a true mountain lodge feel. The loft has 3 beds side by side, a TV area, a bathroom and an unobstructed view of treetops and sky. The floor has 2 private main bedrooms. а kitchen/dining area, a bathroom and another seating area just off the deck. The best part is relaxing in the overlooking hot tub the Grandfather Run, the drifting snow or the starry skies.

Meals will be planned and members will share the cost of the food. There will be three dinners and three breakfasts. Bring your own food for lunch.
