FROM THE TREASURER

As of September 30, 2018, the ski club has \$14,791.32 in the bank. Sounds like a lot doesn't it? Not so much! We must maintain a balance of \$10,000 just for cash flow.

Some examples of expenses: to have the road margins mowed, the bill can be around \$3,500. This must be done every other year.

Snow grooming each month in a good snow year can be around \$4,000.00. Our bank balance doesn't look so great now, does it? So how do the trails get groomed? For snow grooming and other expenses, we go after 2 grants: The 1st grant is Washington State Snow Park fund monies. Basically, this pays for port-a-potty, some snow grooming and the plowing of the parking lot. Each vendor (e.g. snow groomer) bills the state

direct; it does not go through our bank account. The 2nd grant is federal NRTP. There is a volunteer labor match component to this, thus, our work parties. This money does come through our treasury in the form of 'reimbursement of expenses'. Thus, the cash flow balance mentioned above. This money reimburses, mowing, work party expenses, the club's equipment maintenance, and, snow grooming once the groomer has exhausted our grant of the state snow park fund. Last season, the federal funds were lacking and no NRTP grant was given. It is a 2year grant. Thus, no money for expenses last season, nor this season. John Keates has volunteered to write the grant seeking federal monies for the next 2-year window. Thank John when you see him!

Last season our Snow Park grant was for \$8,778.69. The grant was written by Lynne Oliver. This season the club was again granted \$8,778.69 of the state snow park funds.

Since it costs over \$1000 to \$1300 for each day the trails are groomed, the on-going Snow Park grant of \$8778.69 only allowed once a week grooming for part of the season. That grant typically ran out of funds in mid-January! So, for the last 2 seasons Jim Rhodes applied for and got NNSC an additional Snow Park grant for \$14,680.00. This allowed grooming up to twice a week, and, for the full season. So, there is a total of \$23.458.69 for this season for snow grooming that will not go through the ski club treasury.

Jim is unable to write the supplemental Snow Park grant for next season, so we need a volunteer to do the next season's additional grant

application. Without volunteers to write these grants and do trail maintenance, the roads and trails of the Salmon Ridge trail system would become brushy, ungroomed back-country trails. The winter recreation community depends upon us not to let that happen. So please contact a board member and learn how you can help."

SALMON RIDGE UPDATE

Autumn leaves and a good crew made it a gorgeous time to be out in the woods working on the trails. Since it has been drier than normal, there isn't as much brushy growth as we usually encounter. We did some brush cutting on East Cougar trail so woody shrubs in the middle of the trail don't poke up and trip Also work parties skiers. cleared trees that were leaning over or had fallen onto the lower trails. We don't have grant funds to hire roadside mowing this year. Hopefully, with John Keate's help, next year we'll have NRTP funds to resume mowing again before the

roadsides get too brushy. The snowshoe trails are reasonably clear, though could benefit from additional signage.

Pete's crew continue to work hard on the new Salamander connector. The trail to the overlook (the first quarter) is in reasonably good shape. It is now 'functional', although it needs more flagging. Though power tools have made it to the mid-point of the connector trail! (from the top) - it's still sort of rough going in places and not ready for 'prime time'. He plans to extend the trail, (starting at the bottom) up to the midpoint and still hopes to complete trail this winter! Anyone interested in helping to work on the new connector trail, contact Pete Tryon. I'm sure he'd love to have the help.

Anderson Creek road had a major washout at 0.9 mile from the trail head. Though it was fixed and the road was rebuilt twice before, a third major flood event the following year has caused major road damage and torn out the culverts at that So, the USFS has location. closed the road and vehicles are prohibited access. Since putting in a bridge and rebuilding it is prohibitively expensive, the next best option would be a ford at that point. Even that isn't cheap and would take applying for and getting grant funding of \$40 to \$50k. So, until another solution found. it will be an ungroomed, back-country trail.

The good news is since we have plenty of grooming funds for this winter, given enough snow, we may be grooming the lower trails twice a week. The upper trails will be groomed as WA State Sno-Park grant allows, and if the groomer is able to access it. So, get your skis and

snowshoes ready! Winter is just around the corner.

MOUNT SPOKANE

January 18 thru January 21

The Mt. Spokane Cross-Country Ski Park has almost 60 km (37 miles) of trails that range from easy to difficult. The main Selkirk Lodge has indoor plumbing, water, and tables. The Nova Hut has a wood stove and tables, and is a great destination or a resting point on the way to the far trails. Trails groomed nightly, Wednesday through Sunday depending on sufficient snow base and other circumstances. The Cross-Country Ski Park and the Selkirk Lodge opens daily at 7:00 a.m. and closes at 10:00 pm.

Parking – A Sno Park Permit and a Special Groomed Trails Permit sticker are required for each vehicle, and are good for all passengers in the vehicle. Drivers are responsible for the Sno Park Permit. Riders will share the cost of the Special Groomed Trails Permit. The SGTP will stay with the driver after the trip is completed. The Snow Park Permit and SGTP contribute to a State fund that pays for snow plowing of roads and parking lots, the trail groomer and groomer operator, and other State Park winter maintenance expenses.

Housing – Oxford Suites at 15015 E Indiana Avenue, Spokane Valley, WA 99216. Rooms are a group rate of \$105 each plus guest room taxes currently at 12.9% plus a \$2 tourism tax per night. Reservations can be made at

Your reservation must be made by 12-19-2018 after which rooms that are not reserved will be returned to general inventory.
